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Airmen deploy to Djibouti and Afghanistan Deployments range from 40 days to four months

129th Airmen said their goodbyes to loved ones and shipped off to Afghanistan and Djibouti in April and May.

The first deployment to depart was the 130th Rescue Squadron and various support personnel. More than 50 aircrew members, maintainers and support personnel, and two MC-130P Combat Shadow aircraft deployed to Djibouti to provide combat search and rescue support for Combined Joint Task Force-Horn of Africa.

Two weeks after the

Djibouti deployment, more than 65 Airmen and three HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopters deployed for two to four months to provide combat search and rescue support for Operation Enduring Freedom. All told, approximately 100 servicemembers are deploying to Afghanistan over the course of their fourmonth tour.

"After a busy year of saving lives during fires and hurricanes, our Airmen are ready to perform our combat search and rescue mission overseas," said Col. Amos Bagdasarian, 129th Rescue Wing commander.

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Commander's Commentary: 2009 AEF deployments take off

The 129th Rescue Wing recently deployed more than a 100 Airmen halfway around the world. At the end of April we sent our aircrews, support personnel and MC-130Ps to Djibouti, and a few days later we went through the deployment process again to get our HH-60G folks out the door to Afghanistan.

All of the deployment groups made it over to their respective areas of operation safe and sound, due largely to our cargo and personnel deployment



function staffs. We need to thank the personnel manning the CDF and PDF, as well as the LGRDX folks for truly exceptional service. This was no easy feat due to challenges leading up to the departures of our people and equipment.

This deployment had many variables, from multiple groups moving to different locations on different aircraft, numerous last minute personnel and equipment changes, to airlift slips. With this level of complexity for a deployment, it's imperative that everyone's individual mobilization readiness be in order.

Tasks and training assigned by the unit or IDO must be accomplished promptly in order to have a smooth deployment departure from the base. We need to be proactive in preparing and executing deployments so we can concentrate on the mission when called.

Whether we are involved with combat overseas, hurricanes in the Gulf Coast, or fires here in California, we must maintain a high level of readiness. This means being fit, medically qualified, and being current in your AFSC, ancillary and war skills training, along with maintaining up to date personal information, wills, powers of attorney, etc. From top to bottom, commander to Airman, it's everyone's responsibility to be ready to deploy.

Thank you for your hard work and long hours. We still have a few more deployments to process and the redeployments to execute, keep up the great work.

Lastly, we are at the beginning of the "101 Days of Summer," which started Memorial Day weekend and ends Labor Day weekend. This is a time of outdoor fun, but also a time where many accidents occur. Please be cautious as you enjoy the longer days and warmer weather. Minimize your risks, wear proper gear and perform personal risk assessments. Our nation, communities, families, friends and co-workers depend on your service and commitment, so please be safe in everything you do.

"It shouldn't be forgotten that support from their families and employers are also critical to the success of this deployment," Colonel Bagdasarian added.

The 129th Airmen deployed to Afghanistan hit the ground running once they arrived in country.

Lt. Col. Daniel Lapostole, 129th Expeditionary Rescue Squadron commander, assumed command of the 129th ERQS during a ceremony at Kandahar Air Field, Afghanistan, May 5. The 129th ERQS has the primary mission of performing combat search and rescue tasks. The 129th is the lead CSAR unit in Afghanistan.

The unit surpassed the 600 save mark when members from the 129th ERQS rescued two Afghan National Army soldiers May 15, raising the number of lives saved by the unit from

Silicon Valley rescue C-130s go digital with data link

Nestled in the center of the world's technology epicenter is the 129th Rescue Wing of the California National Guard. Search and rescue is the wing's primary mission, which often involves low-tech but courageous life-saving actions.

The mission is about to get a high-tech boost from an innovative communication format called Situation Awareness Data Link, or SADL. A test version of the system was recently installed and evaluated on a 129th MC-130P Combat Shadow tanker.

Similar to the Link 16 format used by other Air Force platforms, such as F-15 Eagles, SADL is a military communications system that supports the exchange of tactical information between air and land assets in near real time. Operators can digitally access this information from command and control systems instead of receiving verbal reports and then annotating the information on paper. The system is already in use by A-10A/C Thunderbolts and some F-16C Fighting Falcons.

"When the 129th Rescue Wing responds to crises such as the California wildfires and Hurricane Ike last year, a significant observation was the need for a self-contained airborne network capability to facilitate digital communications between rescue aircraft, pararescue forces, and distant command centers," said Lt. Col. Steve Butow, 129th Operations Group deputy commander. "These rescue forces will no longer be constrained to voice only communications in their life saving mission.

Also recognizing this need for digital airborne communications were participants in the Guard and Reserve Weapons and Tactics Conference

(WEPTAC), which takes place annually at the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve Test Center (AATC) in Tucson, Ariz.

"The Situation Awareness Data Link was on the primary objective list during WEPTAC the past four years," said Maj. Jose Agredano, 129th Operations Group chief of tactics and 2008 WEPTAC chairman.

"We were able to bring the major players together last year and brainstorm a walk-on solution."

The service's need for the system coupled with the 129th RQW's operational experience provided momentum for generating a solution at WEPTAC. "The data link is one of the Air Force's highest priorities for today's joint fight," Colonel Butow added.

The 129th RQW was one of three units evaluating a more permanent SADL solution.

The 129th, along with C-130s from the West Virginia Air National Guard's 130th Airlift Wing from Charleston and Air Force Reserve Command's 910th Airlift Wing from Youngstown-Warren Air Reserve Station, Ohio, participated in an Operational Utility Evaluation with AATC at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Ariz., April 13 to 17.

"The exercise was a huge step for not only this unit but for every unit that participated," said Tech. Sgt. Elliott Paige, 130th Rescue Squadron radio operator with the 129th Rescue Wing. He was the first 130th RQS RO trained on SADL and coordinated the SADL channels with the Western Air Defense Sector for training here and at the OUE.

"There were Reserve and Guard units working side-by-side to prove the interoperability of this highly capable system, and develop TTPs [tactics, techniques and procedures] and a working solution for aircrews operating this

system," Sergeant Paige said. After testing SADL at Davis-Monthan, 129th RQW operators came home with a sense of accomplishment and are excited about the positive impact SADL will have on future missions at

"Rescue MC-130Ps will serve as a digital gateway for other military aircraft and land forces during disaster response operations such as a Bay Area

earthquake response," Colonel Butow said. "It is only fitting that Silicon Valley's specialized rescue force be amongst the first to go digital."

In the coming years, HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopters and the Guardian Angel pararescue weapon system will also be equipped with SADL. All three rescue weapon systems will have the ability to share digital information, which will enhance the unit's ability to save lives.

"SADL will revolutionize rescue," Major Agredano said. "The possibilities are endless."

129th receives Air Force outstanding unit award

Members of the 129th Rescue Wing were notified April 30 that the wing was the recipient of the

2008 Air Force Outstanding Unit Award. "It is my pleasure to notify all members of the 129th ROW that we have received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award for 2008," said Col. Amos Bagdasarian, 129th Rescue Wing commander. "This is a great achievement and directly reflects on the professionalism and dedication of all our members."

The award was granted for meritorious service during December 2006 to November 2008. During this period, the 129th Rescue Wing was credited with saving 40 lives under extreme conditions. From the high desert mountains of Afghanistan to remote areas more than 500 miles off the Pacific Coast, the safe and successful conduct of each operation is a testament to the unit's experience and leadership.

Examples of the unit's outstanding performance during the award time period:

- The wing received an overall Excellent rating during a phase two operational readiness inspection in December 2006. With 14 areas rated outstanding and 38 areas rated excellent, this was the highest point score awarded to a Combat Search and Rescue unit to date.

- More than 70 Airmen and three HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopters deployed for 120-days to Kandahar Airfield, Afghanistan in April 2007 to perform combat search and rescue and joint personnel recovery operations in support of

Operation Enduring Freedom.

- In May 2007 more than 50 Airmen, along with two MC-130P Combat Shadow aircraft, deployed to Djibouti for in support of Combined Joint Task Force-Horn of Africa.

- During the 2008 Northern California firefight, Operation Lightning Strike, two HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopters and aircrews were certified to perform water bucket drops on the fires for the first time in unit history. Overall, the crews dropped more than 150,000 gallons of water.

Crews stationed in Redding during Operation Lightning Strike landed in rugged Northern California terrain to medevac injured firefighters.

- The unit assisted the Gulf Coast region in 2008 during Hurricanes Gustav and Ike, saving 34 people and 11 dogs.

- Along with responding to state emergencies, rescue crews performed two long-range over water missions. The first was a June 2008 mission 550 miles off the coast of California for a critically ill crewmember aboard a cargo vessel.

- In July 2008, while still immersed in firefighting operations, crews saved a Canadian fisherman aboard a fishing boat 600 miles off the coast. Both patients were transported to the Regional Medical Center of San Jose.

This was the seventh time the wing has been awarded the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award.

"The competition was extremely keen, and each winner is commended for having been selected from an outstanding group of nominees," said Lt. Gen. Harry M. Wyatt, III, director of the Air National Guard.
